100 years

Stephanie Flora, Oregon Trail expert, speaks at November program meeting

Do you have an ancestor who arrived in the Oregon by crossing the Oregon Trail? Are you just naturally interested Oregon history? Have you ever wondered how hundreds of people had the nerve to leave their homes in the east, pack up all their belongings, and head west in a covered wagon? If you want answers to these and other questions, be sure to attend the Troutdale Historical Society's program meeting on November 19, 2006. We will meet at the **Troutdale City Hall, 104 SE Kibling St., Troutdale, Oregon at 2 P.M. on November 19, 2006**. Free Admission, Donations Welcome.

Our featured speaker will be Stephanie Flora, an expert on the Oregon Trail and the pioneers who crossed it. Ms. Flora has been compiling information on the Oregon Trail and emigrants to the Oregon Territory since 1987. She has received several awards for her website including the Distinguished Service Award in 2005 from the Oregon-California Trail Association for her contribution to preserving trail history.

In her biography, Ms. Flora states that members of her pioneer family settled in or near Marion County in 1847. She is a member of the Oregon Historical Society, Marion County Historical Society, Polk Count Historical Society, and Genealogical Forum of Oregon.

She has created a website to inform the public about the Oregon Territory and its pioneers. Her website is divided into four sections: The Settling of Oregon, The Journey, Emigrant Lists, and Researching the Pioneers. Each of these sections is broken down into many more pieces. Under the settling of Oregon, she lists Native Americans, French Canadians, Explorers, Fur Traders, Missionaries, and Early Government. The emigrant lists range from pre-1839 to 1855. In her presentation to us she will include a look at the emigration process and how to find out what train an emigrant traveled on.

Thanks to the Gresham Outlook, we have copies for sale at the depot of a rare edition of the Nov. 19, 1891 Trout-dale Champion donated to us last year by the Allard family. However, the folks at The Outlook are fond of old newspapers and took an image of it and ran copies for us on newsprint on their press. They are marked as reproductions. We wouldn't want someone picking one up, yellowing it with tea and selling it on E-bay as the real thing. Others will be placed in our library as research copies where they can be used for free. Money from the sale of the reproductions will go to pay costs of archiving processes.

And speaking of lovely treasures that come our way, Roy Fall of Rockwood recently stopped by to donate a beautiful souvenir book on the Columbia River Highway that is in such fine condition that it still has the original \$1.00 price tag inside. Changes Proposed to Sandy River Delta channel

The Forest Service invites comments on a proposal to remove a small dam near the mouth of the Sandy River. Historically, the Sandy River channel split into two courses at the Sandy River Delta; the easterly flowing original channel, and a northwesterly flowing overflow channel known then as the "Little Sandy River".

In the 1930s, a small dam was placed across the original channel of the Sandy River, and the main channel was routed into its present course in the historic "Little Sandy River".

The Forest Service has several proposals for Sandy River Delta projects. You may view an overview of these projects at:

The proposed changes include removing the dam, removing 55,000 cubic yards of sediment, removing four acres of vegetation, constructing a bridge for utility maintenance vehicles and a single lane road to access the ends of the bridge and removing and restoring about 1,000 feet of existing road to native plants.


