

## **2004 Cemetery Tour** With Stan Clarke

The cemetery tour took off from the Depot with Stan Clarke, our tour guide, reading from a book of hilarious epitaphs! Gene Stone, our bus driver took us first to the "Cliffside cemetery" on Ten Eyck road where a lot of early pio-



neers are buried. Stan dated the cemeteries first burial at around 1889. Cliffside is famous for it's serenity. Some of the stones there are; Nettie Connett, (early Aims lady logger) and Adolph Aschoff (founder of Marmot and the Aschoff Mtn.



Home). Then we boarded the bus and continued on to Firhill cemetery on the main drag of Sandy, OR. It was in Firhill we recognized the names of the founders of the town of Sandy. All the while we are looking, Stan Clarke is teaching us the hidden messages on tombstones. We learned why so many of the black flat tombstones were broken; it was not vandals, it was the fact they were made of black glass and the weather had cracked the glass so badly that only shards were left. After Firhill cemetery, all boarded the bus for

McDonald's in Sandy for a break and talk about what we had just seen and more questions for Stan. Next we visited the beautiful old church cemetery at Pleasant Valley.....Here, we were visited by the neighbors Llamas and horses reaching over the fence, curious about why we were there.

Next year there is talk of visiting Indian burial grounds in Lyle Washington...start to make your plans now for the tour next May.


