

THS March 18 Program: Len Otto presents "The Army Corps of Engineers" Troutdale Lab

From wartime warehouse to state of the art testing laboratory, the US Army Corps of Engineers Troutdale Lab did it all: chemistry, concrete, soils, and petrography.

The North Pacific Division (NPD) Materials Laboratory, also known as the Troutdale Lab, was built in 1941-1943 as one of the two warehouses constructed by the Defense Plant Corporation in association with the Troutdale Aluminum Plant. The two warehouse buildings were purchased by the North Pacific Division of the United States materials testing laboratory the western United States. for the USACE.





Memories of 'Living by the River'

he rental cabins have long ago been removed and the hole where they once stood has been filled in and paved over, creating the parking lot for Glenn Otto Community Park.

Lr. and Mrs. (Elliott and Ruby) Staten owned and operated those low income rental units as well as a filling station at the west end of the Sandy River bridge on the Old Columbia River Highway.

r. Staten took to me and Tommy from the first time we met and our friendship lasted long after we moved away from Troutdale. Colorful and perhaps eccentric would be two choices to describe the spry old gentleman who taught us various things in those early years including mumbley-peg, a knife game that every boy of that era played. He told us the game required three pieces of equipment. A knife and a pair of shoes. Me and Tommy ran barefoot for the most part in the summer. Guess it was his way of telling us it was best played in winter.

Le showed how to select the best firewood on our trips up to the Larch Mountain area to get firewood for his rental units. It was on one of those trips that he taught us the Tarzan holler that would have made Johnny Weissmuller envious, and Tommy would answer with a similar holler of his own. They had established a communication system of their own.

ne thing we remember about Mrs. Staten is the fantastic home made popcorn balls she would hand out at Halloween. We would eat them before

I here was a long driveway coming off the old highway and as Tommy and I started walking that late autumn day recently with the sun shining and a slight hint of the east wind, we stepped back in time to the years when two little tow-heads roamed freely throughout the campground. Past the tabernacle on our left, now called the Sam K. Cox Building was a large fish pond that had several gold fish and a large rock garden surrounding most of the pond. That rock garden was a favorite destination during "hide and seek" games.

1 few feet farther on our right was a rental house where my very first best friend lived. Just past this house was a pumice block building that some say was built by the 80-year-old caretaker of the campground, Mr. Cass, all by himself. But I know better. When I'd come home from kindergarten, he would be working on the wards the south boundary of the building and I would stop to help him. campground where we lived for a few I couldn't do much, but I sure tried

In certain trees back there near the south end of the park, we located old disconnected electric wires and ceramic electric insulators from a bygone grid that provided electricity to the different buildings throughout the campground that have all been removed by floods, storms our Mom and we had a theory for that. and progress.

I would follow suit and upon reaching the porch, there was Tommy catching his breath with an ear to ear grin and waiting for Mr. Staten's return whoop.

Troutdale and THS Loses a Friend


Vernon Rathman.

Vern Rathman, former mayor of Troutdale and longtime community supporter, died Friday, Feb. 17. He was 84 and a resident of Sandy.



Vern served as mayor of Troutdale from 1960 to 1964 and was involved in several civic organizations, including the Troutdale Lions and the Troutdale Historical Society. He was an excavating contractor and served on the city's first planning commission.





















Beverly Welker Potts

Beverly, the daughter of Charles and Edna Welker was born Sept. 28, 1931 in Portland. She died in the loving care of the staff of Adams House of Oatfield Estates. She was preceded in death by Robert Potts, her husband of seven years. Beverly attended Franklin High School and Vanport. She received her B.A. from Portland State University, and her Master of Librarianship from The University of Portland. She worked as a long distance operator at Pacific Northwest Bell and taught at Central School in Seaside. When she retired, she was a librarian at William Knight Elementary in Canby. Activities during retirement included cataloging photos for the Troutdale Historical Society, driving for Loaves and Fishes and reading on air for Golden Hours.

Gresham resident Carol Patricia Ehr, 82, died on Feb. 18.

Pat was born Sept. 22, 1929, in Weiser, Idaho. The family moved to Portland at the start of World War II and Pat attended Jefferson High School. During her senior year, the family moved back to their ranch in Eastern Oregon, where she graduated in 1947 from Vale Union High. She attended Eastern Oregon College.

On Feb. 5, 1955, she married Richard Ehr. They resided in the Parkrose area. After raising their children, Pat and Dick moved to Gresham where they resided for the past 25 years. Pat enjoyed helping Dick, an architect, build architectural models as well as much of their furniture.

Pat was an avid swimmer and skier. She was a cook, seamstress, knitter and creator of her own patterns. She also enjoyed reading, jigsaw puzzles and card games, especially bridge. She was involved in Meals On Wheels and the League of Women Voters. Pat was an interviewer for the U.S. Census Bureau for 21 years. She traveled throughout the western states and to China, Russia, Europe, the Panama Canal and other places. Pat volunteered for Troutdale Historical Society for several years reviewing articles for the library.


