Get on Board

This year's Trek takes us to lovely downtown Vancouver, Wa. There have been two recent archeological digs in the downtown area, one for the convention center and one for the Columbian's new building. There were many artifacts unearthed that will be in a new exhibit at the museum. Artifacts dating back to 1857, when homes and businesses first settled here. The museum itself is in the wonderful old Carnegie Library building.

Next there will be a guided walking tour (one-half hour) of some of the historic buildings near the museum.

Next stop is a box lunch picnic at Ft. Vancouver. After lunch we will have a guided tour of the archeological lab at the fort. We will learn how those digs are done, what the current projects are and see artifacts dating back to the fort days ... early 1800s. A recent article about Fort Vancouver registered surprise by many Oregonians and Northwesterners that they had never heard of the site, which is incredibly important in Northwest history. Historians are the last people to be ignorant of Fort Vancouver, but it never hurts to go back and bone up on this place and what a mecca it had to have been at the end of 3,000 wilderness miles. On our May cemetery tour we visited the graves of John McLoughlin and his wife. Now we will go back to the place where Dr. McLoughlin was king.

We are fortunate to have **Sharon Nesbit** on board with her wonderful cache of historic information and stories.

The Harlow House roof lost a big area of shingles on the west side this past winter. It turns out we do have some insurance coverage. 




